# Q. Where do I submit my rear yard landscape plans?

A. Landscape plans should be brought to:

# Q. Is there a fee for review of landscape plans?

A. No fees are charged for review of landscape plans.

#### Q. What about additions to my home?

A. All modifications, additions, and improvements to your home or lot must be approved prior to said construction. For example, if you wish to repaint the exterior of your house, or add a patio cover to the rear of your home, you will need to submit plans for the proposed improvement to the Review Committee.

# Q. Who is the Design Review Committee (DRC)?

A. The Design Review (South) Committee currently consists of three appointed members from Rancho Viejo de Santa Fe, Inc., the Developer. Two of these are also homeowners.

# Q. How long does it take to receive notification of the approval/disapproval?

A. Architectural review submittals are typically reviewed within a two week period. The owner is then notified via first class mail whether the improvement was approved or disapproved.

# Q. What happens if my plans are disapproved?

A. A disapproval letter will usually recommend changes to your submittal that will allow you to resubmit and receive approval. Unless the proposed item is specifically disapproved, modifications can usually be made to your original plans to allow approval. Please remember: Do not begin construction on any improvement unless it has been approved by the Design Review Committee.

If proposed modification(s) is a structure (i.e. play structures, portals, etc.), the following information must be submitted in order to be evaluated by the DRC:

- ✓ elevation drawings indicating dimensions (drawing showing view of structure from the front and side)
- ✓ location of structure on lot indicated on a plot plan
- ✓ materials/finishes

If proposed modification(s) is landscaping or hardscaping (i.e. sidewalks, driveway additions, etc.), the following information must be submitted in order to be evaluated by the DRC:

- ✓ drawing indicating the location of each feature on your lot
- ✓ materials and/or plant list
- ✓ dimensions of modification (i.e. sidewalks, patios, etc.) if applicable

Any changes or omissions made to this submittal after approval is granted MUST BE REVIEWED AND APPROVED BY THE DESIGN REVIEW COMMITTEE before the changes or omissions are made. Some submittals may also require approval from other entities.

No member of the Design Review Committee shall be responsible in any way for any defects in any plans and/or specifications submitted in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Rancho Viejo South Community Association, nor for any structural defects in any building or structure erected according to such plans and specifications. In addition, no member of the Design Review Committee shall be responsible for any drainage problems encountered resulting from grading changes on the lot.

# Rancho Viejo Approved Plants List Revised: Oct. 2007

Rancho Viejo is surrounded by beauty – the earth, the sky and the landscape. Rancho Viejo's landscape guidelines were developed to retain this natural beauty.

The landscape guidelines for Rancho Viejo emphasize using native New Mexico plants. Our native New Mexican trees, shrubs and wildflowers have proven that they can provide color and beauty on the limited natural rainfall of Santa Fe. Using native and drought-tolerant plants reduces the community's use of water-saving precious water and lowering homeowner association maintenance costs.

# A. LANDSCAPE PLANTS

Specific plants have been approved for use at Rancho Viejo. Plants not on the approved lists can be submitted for review to the South Homeowners Association Review Committee. The Design Review Committee may make modifications to the plant list yearly.

Within walled courtyards and walled rear yards on the residential lots, unlisted plants may be used unless otherwise noted or listed on the <u>Moist Plants</u> or <u>Prohibited Plants</u> lists. Walled areas are defined as enclosed areas with walls a minimum of four feet tall.

# B. THE PLANT LISTS

Plants in the community visible portions of residential lots are required to be native and drought-tolerant species in order to conserve water.

The plant lists are grouped according to general water use characteristics.

Dry Moderate Moist Prohibited

The plants may be used in the following areas:

Dry Plants	All areas of the Village Estate Lots (required in any area not enclosed by walls)
Moderate Plants	Front and side yards of Garden, Courtyard and Vista Series Walled areas (enclosed courtyards and walled rear yards) Non-residential lots
Moist Plants	May be used in public and non-residential lots with approval of the Design Review Committee
<b>Prohibited Plants</b>	Not allowed for use at Rancho Viejo

# I. DRY PLANTS

The criteria for Dry Plants are that, after three years, these plants require only infrequent watering perhaps twice to once a month during the summer. Winter watering is needed only in the driest years.

# II. MODERATE PLANTS LIST

After establishment, Moderate Plants require irrigation approximately once to twice a week during the summer growing season and once a month during the winter months.

The list of moderate plants is not a comprehensive list of moderate water use plants adapted to the Santa Fe locale, but a list deemed to blend with the landscape intent of Rancho Viejo.

Shrubs and perennials listed below are allowed in any areas outside walled courtyards or walled rear yards. Unlisted species or varieties of shrubs and perennials are allowed in any walled areas, unless specifically noted or on the <u>Moist Plants</u> or <u>Prohibited Plants</u> lists.

Moderate water using plants may be used in the following areas:

Front and side yards of Garden, Courtyard and Vista Series and Estate Lot Housing, Walled areas (enclosed courtyards and walled rear yards) Non-residential lots

# III. MOIST PLANTS LIST

Moist Plants require regular frequent watering, perhaps 2-5 waterings per week after establishment and require even winter moisture to be healthy. These high water using plants have a very limited use at Rancho Viejo. Moist Plants may be allowed for use in water harvesting locations, public and non-residential areas with approval of the Design Review Committee.
